
The requirements will be as followed:

Colors: Red, White and Blue



Cases for Smiles pillowcases is another one of our biggest community service projects. You have been putting smiles on children's faces for 16 years. These simple pillowcases bring a great joy to the children with cancer or another terminal illness, and their parents. This little bit of brightness adds a lot to their day. The pattern is simple: see attachment.

Note: Make sure to wash the pillowcase for the protection of the children with suppressed immunity and do not use any softener. In addition, please place each pillowcase in its own zip lock bag.

## Do you take cash donations?

We prefer checks, which can be made payable to Case for Smiles. You can also go online to support our mission and donate. It's easy and secure.

## What can I donate other than fabric?

Unscented detergent

 Ziploc plastic bags: 1 quart size (each pillowcase smile is delivered in its own Ziploc bag)

• Monetary donations are also welcomed! It currently costs about \$11.00 to make a pillowcase. Donations can easily and securely be made online.

## How do I wash the pillowcases?

• Most chapters suggest the use of an unscented detergent in cold water with no fabric softener.

• Tampa hospitals require the pillowcases to be washed in vinegar and water

- Dry the case no scented dryer sheets
- Iron pillowcase and place in a Ziploc plastic bag

## Can I deliver the pillowcases myself?

No. The hospitals each have standards we must follow, especially due to the children's low

immunity while under treatment. Additionally, many facilities have limited storage and we deliver based on available space.

## Is it okay to put a note in the pillowcase?

Yes, a personal note may be inserted (no pins) into the plastic Ziploc bag. Personal notes cannot be of a religious nature.

## Do you accept seasonal pillowcases?

Yes, the children love them. In fact, during Halloween, we have seen the children use their pillowcases as Trick or Treat bags. Please note seasonal bags cannot be of a religious nature or theme.

## Can I receive a tax credit for sewing pillowcases?

Yes. We are a charitable, 501(c)3 organization. Provide your Regional Coordinator with your name, mailing address and number of pillowcases sewn and we will provide a letter reflecting your donation. All requests must be received by January 15th.

# Sadly, I don't sew, but I DO have many other talents!

What can I do to 'help'?

Everyone has a talent that is needed to help

with the pillowcases!

- Fabric needs to be cut and washed
- Pillowcases need to be ironed
- Pillowcases need to be picked up from drop-off sites
- Fundraising is necessary to purchase
- additional fabric, thread, and supplies.

# What kind of fabric can I use to sew pillowcases?

- Fabric needs to be 100% cotton
- Remember to use fun, colorful novelty prints!
- Check with <u>local coordinator for local</u> <u>hospitals</u> specific requirements

for example: often time hospitals don't allow flannel and RED pillowcases tend to bleed.

We do not accept 'No-sew pillowcases'.

## What pattern can I use to sew pillowcases?

Hospitals use standard size pillowcases (20 x 26 inches)

Choose a bright and colorful fabric style:

- Border:  $1/_3$  of a yard of fabric cut into a strip: 10  $1/_2$  inches by  $40^1/_2$  inches
- Case:  $3/_4$  of a yard:  $26 1/_2$  inches by  $40 1/_2$  inches

## Fleece Blankets for Children

In talking with Akron Children's Hospital - their patients prefer the fleece blankets. We will also work with "Linus Blankets". Check with your local hospitals on the "Wish List" for the kids.

Below are the instructions from Diana Stump, Columbus Area, Ohio Chapter Coordinator. Check with your Family Activity Chairperson for the full colored instruction. **Project Linus** 

No-Sew Fleece – "slip fringe through slit"

**Blanket Instructions** 

You will need...

...1&1/2 to 2 yards of a single layer

"blizzard" or "anti-pill" fleece.

(please do not use "make-it and give it kits"—fabric too thin)

...Sharp fabric scissors, masking tape, pen or marker, ruler

Step 1: Using sharp scissors, remove both selvage edges along the length of the fleece. The salvege edge sometimes has words printed on it. Salvege edges may seem "hidden" and not obvious. Look for small holes the length of the fabric. The trimmed edge should be straight and smooth. (Fabric rolls, does not look nice if the selvage is left on)

Step 2: Cut a 4 inch square out of each corner of the fleece. This allows the blanket to lay flat.

Step 3: With the fabric laying flat on a table, place masking tape from one side to the other, 4 inches up from the bottom edge of the fabric. Use the 4" corner cut outs as a guide.

Step 4: Using a ruler as a guide, mark lines every inch along the masking tape with a pen or pencil. \*\*Do not mark directly on the fabric.

Step 5: Starting from one side, cut a straight line up to the tape at each mark. The fringe will measure 1" wide by 4" long. After cutting the first side, pick up the tape, and place it on the next side. Continue cutting the fringe on all other sides of the blanket. Fringe lengths and widths should be the same on all sides of the blanket.

Step 6: fold the fringe up to the edge of the blanket Step 7: snip a TINY slit in the fringe at the fold.

Step 7: From the underside of the blanket, push the fringe into the slit and gently pull through. Using a small crochet hook, or the end of a pencil might help push the fringe corner into the slit to start pulling it through. DS 7/2023

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## NOTE:

COMFORT TOYS – Toys must be soft sculpture, filled with a commercial fiberfill. Entries must conform to U.S. Safety Regulations with no sharp edges that might injure a child; trimmings must be secure with NO buttons or glue-on eyes. Only one toy per person is allowed for judging. All judging will be done at State Level. Toys are judged on cleanliness, safety, general appearance and workmanship. Only the comfort toy winning your county contest will be accepted at convention. All toys received will be donated to a local hospital to comfort the children who must be there for treatment or come into the emergency room..

Class C - Embroidery - Your choice of item. May be any type or style of embroidered item: Crewel, Huck/Swedish weaving, needlepoint and etc....

C1 – Subordinate C2 – Juniors – 5 to 14 years of Age – they all come to State for judging

Class D - Counted Cross Stitch - Item may be mounted or framed, if appropriated.

VI. Sheep to Shawl Class A – Amigurimi Toy Meaning of "amigurimi" - The word is a blend of the words ami (編) meaning crocheted or knitted, and nuigurumi a small, stuffed doll. Although the exact origin of crochet dolls is difficult to place, historians agree that the art probably came from China with records of knitted dolls dating back to the Shang dynasty.

what is the difference between regular crochet and amigurumi?



Amigurumi uses smaller hooks than regular crochet projects.

Take two projects - an amigurumi and nonamigurumi project - and use the same yarn. You'll want to crochet amigurumi with a smaller hook than the non-amigurumi project, so that your stitches come out tighter.
