This devotion will be an abbreviated sermon that was presented at the OH State Grange Convention on October 29th.

Earlier this summer, I visited the Sullivan Church of the Nazarene to hear Darlene Neptune talk about one of the most well known and famous American prolific hymn writers.


Fanny Crosby wrote 8,000 Gospel songs and hymns during a lifetime, which spanned nearly a century. She passed away when she was 95. Frances Jane Crosby was born in Putnam County, New York, on March 24, 1820. A poorly trained doctor applied a mustard plaster poultice to her eyes when she was only six weeks old, rendering her totally blind. Even in her childhood, she realized she had a special gift. However, not even the loss of eyesight could render defeat to this astoundingly courageous soul. Aunt Fanny, as she later was affectionately called, also wrote 1,000+ nonreligious songs, and had four books of poetry and two best-selling autobiographies published.

One day in 1873, Fanny was visiting with a friend, Mrs. Joseph Knapp, a musician of sorts and wife of the founder of Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. During their visit Mrs. Knapp played a tune on her piano, which she had recently written. She then asked Fanny, "What does this tune say?" After kneeling in prayer for a few moments, she rose and declared, "It says, Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine!" Fanny began to dictate verses to Mrs. Knapp, who wrote them down, fitting them to the melody just as we hear it sung today.

In 2001, a premature baby named Christopher Duffley surprised doctors by surviving. At five months old, he entered the foster care system until his aunt's family adopted him. A teacher realized four-year-old Christopher, though blind and diagnosed with autism, had perfect pitch. Six years later at church, Christopher stood onstage and sang, "Open the Eyes of My Heart." The video reached millions online. In 2020, Christopher shared his goals of serving as a disability advocate. He continues to prove that possibilities are limitless with the eyes of his heart open to God's plan. If you search in YouTube for Christopher Duffley, you will be able to view this service.

What do these two peoples lives have in common? They both were blind but that did not inhibit their love of sacred music and the sharing of it.

The lyrics of Great is Thy Faithfulness was written by Thomas Chisholm in 1923. It talks about God's faithful-



ness over his lifetime. Chisholm sent the song to William Runyan in Kansas, who was affiliated with both the Moody Bible Institute and Hope Publishing Company. Runyan set the poem to music, and it was published that same year by Hope Publishing Company and became popular among church groups. The Biblical lyrics reference Lamentations 3:22-23. 22 Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for His compassions never fail. 23 They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. The song was exposed to wide audiences after becoming popular with Dr. William Henry Houghton of the Moody Bible Institute and Billy Graham, who used the song frequently on his international crusades.

Total Praise was written by Richard Smallwood in 1996. He wrote it when his mother had begun struggling with dementia and a family friend was dying of cancer, leaving Smallwood to serve as a caregiver at times for both. Psalm 121:1 - 5 1 I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. 2 My help cometh from the LORD, which made heaven and earth. 3 He will not suffer thy foot to be moved: he that keepeth thee will not slumber. 4 Behold, he that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep. 5 The LORD is thy keeper: the LORD is thy shade upon thy right hand. 6 The sun shall not smite thee by day, nor the moon by night.

One of Richard Smallwood's most beloved and enduring gospel songs is "I Love the Lord." The powerful lyrics and soul-stirring melody have touched the hearts of countless listeners over the years. This song holds a deep and profound meaning that resonates with individuals on their spiritual journeys. At its core, "I Love the Lord" expresses a sincere and unwavering love for God. The lyrics illustrate a deep connection with the divine, an abiding faith, and a yearning to please and honor the Creator. It is a declaration of devotion and a testament to the transformative power of God's love in one's life.

Hallelujah, What a Savior was penned and composed by Philip Bliss. Philip wrote the music for several other hymns as well, including, It is Well. He was called back to Chicago to be with DL Moody and Ira Sankey. Traveling by train in December, the trestle collapsed over the river near Ashtabula, OH. He survived the crash, but he could not find his wife, Lucy. He went back into the wreck looking for his wife where he died in the fire.

Each one of the titles of music above were shared by His B'LL's(D) (pronounced His Bells Duh) individually or as a group and consisted of Brenda Widder, Lisa Tharp, Les Widder and a close family friend, Darius McBride.

As mentioned before, music can speak when words cannot! I hope you have a great rest of your Winter! And a special thanks to Williamsport Grange for organizing and presenting the Memorial Service.



# **Quilts of Valor**

Etta Arnholdt served in the United States Navy from November 9, 1993-November 24, 2002. Etta was a Photographer's Mate Airmen. She was stationed in Alaska, California and Virginia and the USS Dwight D. Eisenhower and the USS Harry S. Truman Aircraft Carriers. While serving, she received the Navy Good Conduct Medal, Overseas Service Ribbon, 2 National Defense Service Medals, Sea Service Deployment Ribbon and the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal.

Wayne Doner was inducted into the United States Army in February 1966. He was trained for 13 weeks on Morse Code that he never had to use. After training he went to Fort Stewart as Bco. Signal NCO and the Company Commander's Driver. Wayne deployed in February 1967 by troop ship to Ben Hoa Air Force Base. He drove all ranks of officers and was awarded Driver of the Month twice. Wayne shared that he had liver and onions almost every day and he still hates liver. Wayne received the Army Commendation Medal, Good Conduct Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal. Wayne was discharged in February 1968.

Arden Fitch served in the United States Air Force from 1969-1973. Arden was stationed at Lackland AFB, Shepherd AFB and Kincheloe AFB. Arden was trained as a plumber. He was deployed to Vietnam just 10 weeks after his marriage to Pat. Arden was part of the US Air Force support group providing maintenance to the base buildings. On December 25, 1971 Arden attended the BOB Hope performance. Later Arden was transferred to Nakhon Phanom, Thailand serving as a military director of the plumbing department. Arden served on the "Equal Opportunities and Treatment Board" focusing on issues involving black and white military personnel. After returning to the states, Arden and Pat moved to California to finish his military service. Arden noted that Olivesburg Grange paid his dues while he served in the US Air Force. Harvey Hinshaw served in the United States Army from 1976-1977. While in Korea, Harvey served as a Chaplain's Assistant. He received a Defense of Korea Medal after discharge.

Richard Mahoney was drafted in the summer of 1959 to serve in the United States Army. He spent time Ft. Hood Texas, Ft. Hood Georgia and at Camp David. As a Spec. 4, he was sent to Korea for one year and worked in phone communications. Rich was discharged in August 1961 in time to help with the Pike Grange food stand at the Stark County Fair.



# 2024 National Grange Quilt Block Contest Split Back Star Block

Pattern courtesy of Kim Di.Joseph This pattern was the 2023 Quilts of Valor official block



pieces Needed for one 12" finished block White: 1-4 ½" square 8-2 ½" squares Red: 3-4 ½" square 1-5" square Blue: 3-4 ½" square 1-5" square

### **Step 1: STAR POINTS**

With 2 red and 2 blue 4  $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares, sew a 2  $\frac{1}{2}$ " white square to one corner. Cut  $\frac{1}{4}$ " off the sew line and press towards the white. Sew the 4 remaining 2  $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares to the other side of the color, cut  $\frac{1}{4}$ " off sew line and press towards the white. These 4 units will make your star points.





### Step 2: HST's

With a 5" red and a 5" blue square. Place right sides together, draw a line diagonally and  $sew^{1/4}$ " on each side of the line.

Cut on the draw line and iron. Square both HST units to  $4 \frac{1}{2}$ ".

#### **Step 3: ASSEMBLE BLOCK**

You will now have 9 squares, each measuring 4 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>". Assemble in 9 patch style to create your QOV Split Back Star.



### **Ohio State Grange Convention 2023 Favorable Resolutions**

#### **Ohio State Grange 2023 Agriculture Committee**

Resolution 001 – Therefore, Be It Resolved The Ohio State Grange members support State and Federal legislation strengthening landowner rights in eminent domain cases.

Resolution 002 & 003 – Therefore, Be It Resolved that Ohio State Grange and National Grange encourage Congress and State Legislatures to enact laws preventing foreign entities from buying or leasing U.S. land, particularly protecting natural resources from abuse to benefit foreign concerns to the detriment of domestic (U.S.) needs.

# Ohio State Grange 2023 Grange-By-Laws & Good of The Order Committee

Resolution 001 – Therefore, Be It Resolved that all resolutions that are voted adversely get a written summary as to why it was rejected in committee.

Resolution 003 – Therefore, Be It Resolved, the Ohio State Grange oppose State Issues 2 in November of 2023, the legalization of Recreational Marijuana

Resolution 005 – Now, Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Ohio State Grange induct Ronald and Aileen Hiltner, Morgan Grange #829, in the Ohio State Grange Hall of Fame for their many contributions and devotion to Patrons of Husbandry.

Changing Report Due Date FAC report – Therefore Be It Revolved that the Ohio State Grange allow the Family Activities Committee to move due date for their report to October 20th, or convention to allow more report to be received.

#### Ohio State Grange 2023 Education & Health Committee

Resolution 004 – Therefore, Be It Resolved, that The National Grange urge our law makers (Congress) to pass regulations that would require manufacturers to label items that have these chemicals used when they are made. Also ask that these items be tested as to how toxic they may be. The consumer should know that PFASs are used in what they are purchasing.

#### Ohio State Grange 2023 Citizenship & Public Affairs, Transportation & Taxation, Labor & Judiciary Committee

Resolution No. 6 – Therefore It Be Resolved, that the Ohio State Grange and National Grange go on record urging our Legislature in Congress to vote yes on concept of 2023/2024 HR1122, HR3712 and SB887 to protect Americans from the Federal Government controlling our money. The Grange needs to be vigilant about any future legislation or federal moves to initiate Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC).

Resolution No. 2 – Therefore It Be Resolved, that the Ohio State Grange request the Ohio Department of Safety to educate, license, and enforce the current law in ORC 4511.521 and ORC 4511.55 on the operation of electric bicycles for the safety of the public.

Resolution No. 3 – Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Ohio State Grange and National Grange go on record asking our congressman and women to start and support legislation that would protect all pension assets; even if they are sold, bartered or traded to a non-qualifying plan.

### **Did You Know?**

Building a snowman is a classic winter activity, but the residents living in Bethel, Maine, took the tradition to the extreme in Feb. 2008 when they spent a month building a Guinness World Record-setting snowpersonwho was, in fact, a snowwoman named Olympia. The frigid figure was made up of 13 million pounds of snow and featured eyelashes that were made from eight pairs of skis, an eight-foot-long nose made from chicken wire and painted cheesecloth, lips made from five red car tires, and arms made from two 30-foot-tall spruce trees. Olympia was also decorated with three giant truck tires as buttons, a 130-foot scarf, a 48-foot-wide fleece hat, and a snowflake pendant that was six-and-a-half feet wide. In total, the impressive snowwoman's height measured just over 122 feet, which is just a few feet shorter than the Statue of Liberty.

# STATE DARTBALL TOURNAMENT Ohio Grange April 6th, 2024

What is Dartball? Short answer- It's a family affair. That's right, unlike many sports, the entire family can participate in the sport of Dartball: grandma, grandpa, dad, mom, brothers and sisters and all of your cousins.

Dartball is a sport that can accommodate those with disabilities. It is easy to make adjustments. For example, moving the batter closer to the dartboard if a player is in a wheelchair, using a walker or dealing with limited arm movement. It is all about helping every person who wants to participate and have fun competing.

**Saturday, April 6th tournament.** With that being said, it is time to talk about the Ohio State Grange Dartball Tournament sponsored by Knox County Granges which is open to all Granges in all 88 counties in Ohio. On April 6, 2024 the Ohio State Grange Dartball Tournament will be played at The Fredericktown Schools Administration building, 117 Columbus Road Fredericktown, Ohio. The Captain's meeting will begin at 9:00am and the tournament will begin at 10:00am. Every Ohio Grange is encouraged to put a team together and participate.

How is Dartball played? Today's American style Dartball is modeled after our American favorite pastime sport-Baseball. The dartboard is a 4-foot square board which resembles a baseball diamond with 1st, 2nd, 3rd, home base, foul ball, outs, and strike areas on the board. The Dartball board height must be 54 inches from the floor to the center of the board. The 6 1/2 inch Apex No.2, 3 or 4 feather wooden dart is used in all competitive matches with a pitching distance (the line from which you throw the dart at the board) of 20 feet. All darts must be thrown underhanded. As in baseball, each team takes a turn at "bat", the other team takes the "field" during the 9-inning game. Each team gets 3 outs. As in baseball, a batter can advance a runner around the bases to score a run. The team that scores the most runs at the end of 9 innings wins, or at the end of overtime innings should both teams be tied at the end of 9 innings.

**Team Makeup:** These rules apply specifically to the April 6, 2024 Ohio Grange State Dartball Tournament. Each team will consist of 6 to 9 players.

For each team with less than 6 players, an automatic out must be taken, but may be placed anywhere in the lineup. 5 is the minimum players allowed for a team. Junior Grangers 10 and older, are allowed to play if a team is in need of players. A team can also use 2 non-Grange members to play on their team if they cannot field 6 players. If an individual Grange does not have enough Dartball players to field a team, they can combine with other Granges from their county and/or another county to fill their roster.

**Format for Tournament** play will be a Round Robin Tournament. In past years, the tournament has been completed before 3 pm. The top 4 Teams receive plaques. Lunch & refreshments will be available during the tournament.


