

As of this writing, the Ohio State Grange convention has not been completed. We have 24 resolutions to discuss and vote on by the delegates. We have 3 resolutions for Agriculture; 3 resolutions for Budget, including a Budget for 2023; 8 resolutions for the By-Laws/Good of the Order; 2 resolutions for the Citizenship/Public Affairs; 3 resolutions for Education/Health; and 5 resolutions for the Transportation /Taxation Committees. There is an election of all the State offices except two Executive Committee. There will be lots to report next issue.

And speaking of elections, November 8 is the election that will elect all the State Offices being Governor, Lt. Governor, Auditor of State, Secretary of State, Treasurer of State and Attorney General. We have a very important U. S. Senate race and also the Chief Justice of the Ohio Supreme Court and two other Supreme Court Justice positions. I know that we all have State Representatives running and half of the Ohio State Senators. So remember to get out and vote on or before November 8th.

Jenny Camper was my guest on the Buckeye Patrons Pulse Podcast and we talked about the legislation passed by the Federal Legislators in regards to the insulin caps in Medicare. This is great news, but we are going to be working on new legislation to include other diseases with high medicine amounts. Why shouldn't they be included with this cap? The second podcast, Jenny Camper and I talked about H. B. 135 at the State Senate. This bill, if passed, will make insurance companies accept coupons that the insurer uses to pay for high medicine and add to your deductible. This just isn't right that if the manufacturer gives you a discount on your medicine, you should be able to use it towards a deductible. The Ohio House of Representatives have passed the bill unanimously and it is sitting in the Senate. Remember, all bills not passed by December 31 are considered dead and have to be reintroduced in 2023 to the new Legislators and all is lost with what we have done this past two years.

In closing, I want to wish everyone a Happy Thanksgiving and a Merry Christmas. This will be my last article as I will not be your Legislative Director next year. I have enjoyed working with everyone and meeting you, but I need to move onward.

Thank you to all who sent reports. Our numbers were down this year. I'll report winners in the Jan./Feb issue. Have a good year.

For the article this time, I'm going to write the program from Deaf Chairman, Jan Doner from Unity Grange #2116 in Mercer County. I felt it was a good program and very informative for all.

"WHY YOU REALLY SHOULDN'T USE Q-TIPS TO CLEAN YOUR EARS"

This is what she wrote.

You cannot only irritate, scratch and cut the ear canal, but you can also damage the ear drum, and render your efforts unsuccessful, by pushing whatever wax has built up even deeper down the ear. People don't really realize the wax they see on the Q-Tip would have come out anyway, because the ear cleans itself.

Earwax can be pesky. In some cases, too much earwax can cause hearing problems, itching, dizziness, and discomfort. But it's a myth that you need to routinely clean out your ears. In most cases earwax is actually healthy and protective for the ear. Earwax helps protect against infections, dry skin, and unwanted dirt and debris. When you use a cotton swab, also known as a Q-Tip, you can accidently damage your ears. In fact the most common causes of eardrum rupture is from trauma, like using cotton swabs or other instruments in your ear.

How often do you need to clean your ears? Most people do not need to routinely clean their ears. Our ears are normally self-cleaning. Our ear wax traps dirt and debris and is slowly pushed out on its own. This helps particles from getting in our ears and also prevents infection. Some people may be at a higher risk for abnormal wax. This is called Cerumen Impaction. You may be at a higher

risk if you are older, wearing hearing aids, or have had a history of Impaction already.

HOW TO SAFELY REMOVE EARWAX WITHOUT US-ING A Q-TIP:

OTC- over the counter alcohol or peroxide-based ear drops may help prevent excessive wax build-up and are generally considered safe, when used as directed.

Hydrogen peroxide used in small drops, can help soften the wax and break down the harden wax, so it comes out on its own.

Mineral oil, also can be used in small drops, helps soften the wax.

Stay around the outer ear, using a tissue is considered safe as long as you do not get into the ear canal. **THE BEST OPTION:**

Your Doctor has a special tool designed to remove earwax build-up or other objects. Sometimes this involves using water and saline to rinse the ear.

I will end with this:

WHAT IF YOU SUDDENLY LOST YOUR HEARING - WHAT ARE SOME OF THE THINGS YOU WOULD MISS HEARING?

Birds, music, people talking (family members and friends), Grandchildren, TV, phone, radio, horns blowing, machinery, animals, water falls, ocean waves, miss being included, leaves blowing in the wind, baby crying, alarm clock, clock ticking.

PLEASE PROTECT YOUR HEARING!!

Thanksgiving History

Thanksgiving Day, annual national holiday in the United States and Canada celebrating the harvest and other blessings of the past year. Americans generally believe that their Thanksgiving is modeled on a 1621 harvest feast shared by the English colonists (Pilgrims) of Plymouth and the Wampanoag people. The American holiday is particularly rich in legend and symbolism, and the traditional fare of the Thanksgiving meal typically includes turkey, bread stuffing, potatoes, cranberries, and pumpkin pie. With respect to vehicular travel, the holiday is often the busiest of the year, as family members gather with one another. Thanksgiving Day is celebrated on Thurs-

day, November 24, 2022.

Plymouth's Thanksgiving began with a few colonists going out "fowling," possibly for turkeys but more probably for the easier prey of geese and ducks, since they "in one day killed as much as...served the company almost a week." Next, 90 or so Wampanoag made a surprise appearance at the settlement's gate, doubtlessly unnerving the 50 or so colonists. Nevertheless, over the next few days the two groups socialized without incident. The Wampanoag contributed venison to the feast, which included the fowl and probably fish, eels, shellfish, stews, vegetables, and beer.

The holidays will soon be upon us, the kids home from school on their holiday breaks, worries about relatives coming over or going over there for dinner, shopping for everyone, not very relaxing couple of months and then the wonderful Ohio weather hitting in the next couple of months. Well now that I made you think of the chaos of the winter months let's look at the opportunities we have in the Family Activity section for you to relax and create things you may never have done before or have not done in a while.

If you're a sewer material will be going on sale or if you have a stock pile you could use some to make a pillowcase out of a yard and a quarter for "Case for Smiles". "Case for Smiles" gives these pillow cases to terminally ill children in the hospitals across the country. Your pillow cases will stay in Ohio and go to one of the children's hospitals here. Diana Nordquest has a friend who is the coordinator in this area, her thank you letter was in the September October magazine, and she is always in need of pillow cases. You can also pick up some fleece, NO fleece for the pillow cases please, and you and the kids could tie two colors together and donate them to "Linus Blankets". The blankets can be just one color of no sew fleece. Any blanket in sizes of baby no smaller them 36"x36", child 40"x60" and teen 45"x72". The blankets can be larger because fleece can come in 54" to 60" wide so you don't cut small piece off and waste but you can use the scrape to make stuffed balls the kids love. if you need a pattern let us know it is very simple the kids, scouts and whoever can make. We also have a very simple fleece hat pattern the kids can make from 22"x15" piece for the deaf committee, our Mom and our niece Alison use to do a bunch when they were able.

We also have a piece of material for you to create a Musical quilt block in memory of Judy Lauby, part of our state pianist couple who passed away this past year and was from Stark County, Ann and my home county. The piece of material is 10-1/2"x10-1/2" and you create a finish block of 12-1/2"x12-1/2" using part or all of this piece of material in combination with other material. Caramel Corn – from Ohio State Grange 2010 Cookbook

Hardin County

¹/₂ cup butter

1 cup packed brown sugar

¹/₄ cup corn syrup

1/2 teaspoon salt

¹/₄ teaspoon soda

¹/₂ teaspoon vanilla

In a saucepan, melt the butter. Stir in sugar, corn syrup and salt. Bring to a boil. Stirring constantly until it boils. Without stirring, boil over medium heat for 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add soda and vanilla. Pour over corn and stir. Put popcorn on large cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Stir every 10 to 15 minutes while baking.

Christmas Plants

Poinsettia (Euphorbia pulcherrima)

Subtropical plants native to Mexico, poinsettias have evolved into a symbol of Christmas because of their festive red and green colors. Also, the shape of the poinsettia's flower is said to symbolize the star of Bethlehem. Be sure not to overwater poinsettias, as they are susceptible to root rot. Water when the top 2 inches of soil feels dry, and make sure the container has adequate drainage. Also, poinsettias need lots of bright, filtered sunlight, so they don't grow leggy.

Mistletoe (Phoradendron leucarpum)

It's tradition to kiss under the mistletoe during the holidays. Mistletoe itself naturally gets up close and personal with other plants. It's classified as parasitic because it attaches to a host tree via a root-like structure called a haustorium. The foliage is evergreen, and female plants will produce a plethora of white berries. Mistletoe plants require very little care, but you will need to start with a healthy, established host tree for them.

Christmas Display at the Grafton Farm



For the past several years we have decorated a hillside hayfield which faces State Route 213 for Halloween, Christmas, Valentines Day, and Easter. This is our Christmas display from 2021. The display is assembled with painted milkjugs with a C-9 lightbulb inserted into the top of each jug and strings of led lights. The tree is approximately 180 feet tall. The Christmas display is lit each evening from dusk until midnight 10 nights before Christmas till 10 nights after Christmas. Ohio Grange Dartball Tournament April 1, 2023

What is Dartball? Short answer- It's a family affair. That's right, unlike many sports, the entire family can participate in the sport of Dartball: grandma, grandpa, dad, mom, brothers and sisters and all of your cousins.

Dartball is a sport that can accommodate those with disabilities. It is easy to make adjustments. For example, moving the batter closer to the dartboard if a player is in a wheelchair, using a walker or dealing with limited arm movement. It is all about helping every person who wants to participate and have fun competing.

Saturday, April 1st tournament. With that being said, it is time to talk about the Ohio State Grange Dartball Tournament sponsored by Knox County Granges which is open to all Granges in all 88 counties in Ohio. On April 1, 2023 the Ohio State Grange Dartball Tournament will be played at The Fredericktown Schools Administration building, 117 Columbus Road Fredericktown, Ohio. The Captain's meeting will begin at 9:00am and the tournament will begin at 10:00am. Every Ohio Grange is encouraged to put a team together and participate.

How is Dartball played? Today's American style Dartball is modeled after our American favorite pastime sport-baseball. The dartboard is a 4-foot square board which resembles a baseball diamond with 1st, 2nd, 3rd, home base, foul ball, outs, and strike areas on the board. The Dartball board height it must be 54 inches from the floor to the center of the board. The 6 ¹/₂ inch Apex No.2, 3 or 4 feather wooden dart is used in all competitive matches with a pitching distance (the line from which you throw the dart at the board) of 20 feet. All darts must be thrown underhanded. As in baseball, each team takes a turn at "bat", the other team takes the "field" during the 9-inning game. Each team gets 3 outs. As in baseball, a batter can advance a runner around the bases to score a run. The team that scores the most runs at the end of 9 innings wins, or at the end of overtime innings should both teams be tied at the end of 9 innings.

Team Makeup: These rules apply specifically to the April 1, 2023 Ohio Grange State Dartball Tournament. Each team will consist of 6 to 9 players.

For each team with less than 6 players, an automatic out must be taken, but may be placed anywhere in the lineup. 5 is the minimum players allowed for a team. Junior Grangers 10 and older, are allowed to play if a team is in need of players. A team can also use 2 non-Grange members to play on their team if they cannot field 6 players. If an individual Grange does not have enough Dartball players to field a team, they can combine with other Granges from their county and/or another county to fill their roster.

Format for Tournament play will be a Round Robin Tournament. In past years, the tournament has been completed before 3 pm. The top 4 Teams receive plaques.

Lunch & refreshments will be available during the tournament.

Installation reminds us of our pledge By Betsy Huber, National Grange President

In my Grange, September is traditionally the month for the election of new officers and their installation. I know some Community Granges are on a different schedule, but many elect and install in the fall.

I urge you to perform the Installation Ceremony in the Subordinate Manual, either the full form or the alternative form. These words are extremely valuable in instructing the officers of the duties they are assuming. The alternative version is succinct and to the point, in modern language taking only 20-30 minutes to do. The full form is more historical, flowery language and takes longer but, like great literature, is beautiful to hear and reminds us of our legacy.

If you don't have an Installing Officer willing to come to your Grange, try having each officer read aloud their charge in turn. Or have each officer install the next one in line - an executive committee member installs the President; the President installs the Vice President; the Vice

President installs the Lecturer, and so on.

The important part of the ceremony is the pledge to perform the duties of the office and abide by the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grange. These pledges mean something within our Grange and even in courts of law. When a person becomes a Grange member and takes the obligation in the Degrees or the Welcoming Ceremony, when a new Grange is formed and members sign the charter application, and when officers pledge to perform their duties - these pledges are just as binding as signing any contract and have been used in recent court cases upholding the Grange rules.

No matter how you choose to install your officers, it is vital that you DO install them using the pledge and instructing them in their duties.
