

Four Signs That It's a Scam

1. Scammers PRETEND to be from an organization you know.

Scammers often pretend to be contacting you on behalf of the government. They might use a real name, like the FTC, Social Security Administration, IRS, or Medicare, or make up a name that sounds official. Some pretend to be from a business you know, like a utility company, a tech company, or even a charity asking for donations. 2. Scammers say there's a PROBLEM or a PRIZE.

They might say you're in trouble with the government. Or you owe money. Or someone in your family had an emergency. Or that there's a virus on your computer.

Some scammers say there's a problem with one of your accounts and that you need to verify some information. 3. Scammers PRESSURE you to act immediately.

Scammers want you to act before you have time to think. If you're on the phone, they might tell you not to hang up so you can't check out their stor

4. Scammers tell you to PAY in a specific way.

They often insist that you can only pay by using cryptocurrency, wiring money through a company like MoneyGram or Western Union, using a payment app, or putting money on a gift card and then giving them the numbers on the back of the card.

Some will send you a check (that will later turn out to be fake), then tell you to deposit it and send them money

Create a bowl from confetti or paper scraps. Blow the balloon up to regular size, but not too stretched out so it can pop later. Cut paper to size, if not already in confetti form. Spread glue or mod podge on the round part of the balloon (without covering the knot) with a paint brush or sponge, then sprinkle with layer of con- counter for at least 2-3 hours before cutting into them. fetti. If you want the bowl to have a flat bottom, press it down on a flat surface lightly. Repeat layers until desired Public Speaking sturdiness of bowl is achieved, allowing the glue to dry between each layer.

Ages 13-1/2 to 21 – DIY No Sew Pillow

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Spray a 9x13 baking dish with nonstick spray. Beat the butter and brown sugar until creamy. Add the eggs and vanilla and beat again. Sift together the salt, baking powder, and flour. Slowly beat into the butter mixture. Stir in 1 cup of M&M candies by hand. Spread the batter in the prepared dish. Sprinkle the top with the extra $\frac{1}{2}$ cup candies. Bake for 22-25 minutes. Let the cookie bars cool completely before cutting into squares. Store in a sealed container. Category B: Impromptu Speech

Participants will draw two topics, select their choice of the two and return one. Impromptu speeches should be at least 1 minute in length and no longer than 5 minutes. Timekeeper will hold up hand when the 1-minute mark has been reached and then 4:30 minute mark has been reached so speaker knows when he/she can stop.

Category C: Youth Ambassador/Youth Patron Prepared Speech

State Ambassador and Young Patrons are required to give a prepared speech at their regional conference the year they apply for the National Grange Youth Leadership team. They must present a speech on one of the following topics:

- What does Grange mean to me?
- What is leadership?
- How can you apply the National Grange mission statement to your future endeavors in the Grange?

The same guidelines as Category S should be followed. Speeches in this category WILL NOT be chosen for Best of Show. Ambassadors/Young Patrons wanting to compete for Best of Show shall enter additionally in Category A.

Sign-A-Song Regional Contest:

Novice Category: One who is beginning to learn sign, has had no more than three sign language classes and has entered the sign-a-song contest no more than two years.

Hobbyist Category: One who signs on an occasional basis and strictly for fun. One who has entered the sign a song contest more than two years.

Group Category: Two or more people signing **Expert Category:** One who signs professionally. Ineligible for Best of Show but looking for an opportunity to encourage others to participate.

Go to the National Grange web site for more details and rules.

Ambassador Contest:

You must be 15 to 21 years of age. Must be single, never married, have no children, and must not marry and/or have children during time of service. If under 18 must have parent/guardian consent.

Young Patron/Young Couple Contest:

Ages 22-35 must have been a grange member for a minimum of one year. Anyone interested in participating in one of these contests, please fill out the application and send it to the Ohio State Grange office by October 1st NO Later.

8 and Under - Brownies

Ingredients:

1 cup packed light brown sugar.

8 Tablespoons (1 stick) butter melted.

1 egg beaten.

1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 1/4 cup flour

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon baking powder

1 cup butterscotch backing chips.

Instructions:

Preheat the oven to 350° F. Line an 8-inch square baking pan with aluminum foil. Be sure to use a piece large enough to cover the sides as well as the bottom.

In a large bowl, add the brown sugar, melted butter, egg, and vanilla extract. Stir them to combine, Add the flour, salt, and baking powder, stir to combine. Fold in the butterscotch chips. The batter will be very thick.

Add the batter to your prepared baking pan and use the back of a spoon or spatula to gently spread the mixture evenly across the bottom of the pan. Bake for 25 minutes or until the center is set and the top is a light golden brown.

9-11 years old - Apple Sauce Cookies

Ingredients:

1 cup Unsweetened Apple Sauce

1 cup sugar

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter

1 egg

2¹/₄ cup flour

2/3 cup raisins, chopped.

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda.

- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cloves

1/4 teaspoon salt

Instructions:

Mix all ingredients together, drop from teaspoon, bake on 375 Degrees for 10-15 minutes depending on oven Let them cool on rack.

12-14 years old - Soft Pretzels

Ingredients: 4 to 4 ¹/₂ cups all-purpose flour 2 Tablespoons sugar package dry active yeast
 ½ teaspoon salt
 cup low fat milk
 cup water
 Tablespoon vegetable oil
 eggs, lightly beaten.
 Coarse Salt to Top
 Instructions:
 Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

In a large bowl, combine 2 cups flour, sugar, undissolved yeast, and salt.

Heat milk, water, oil until warm (120-130 degrees F)

Stir milk mixture into flour mixture until well combined. Add enough of the remaining flour to make a soft dough. Knead on floured surface until smooth and elastic, about 4-6 minutes.

Cover, let rest on floured surface for 10 minutes. Divide dough into 14 equal pieces. Roll each piece into a 20-inch rope.

Cover; let rest 5 to 10 minutes until risen slightly. Shape into pretzel by curving ends of each rope to make a circle, cross ends at top, twist ends to bottom of circle. Place pretzels on two greased baking sheets

Brush with beaten eggs, Bake for 15 minutes.

Remove from oven; brush again with eggs and sprinkle coarse salt.

Return to oven and back for 15 minutes or until lightly brown. Remove pretzels from baking sheet and place on baking rack.

Baking Rules

There are 3 age groups -8 & under, 9-11, and 12 -14. Age shall be as of January 1, 2024, Contestants must be a Junior Grange member in good standing. Contestants must be at least 5 years of age by the county contest.

Place 3 brownies, 3 cookies or 3 pretzels on a disposable plate for judging.

The following information must be neatly printed and securely fastened to all entries: name, age, (as of 1/1/24), date of birth, Junior Grange name and number and county represented. Sewing Contest Glovosaurs Supplies: 2 gloves per dinosaur (matching or not) Sewing thread Sewing needle






If you are not confident that your hand sewn stitches are small enough, just sew a second line of stitches to add strength to the seam.

1) Turn one glove inside out and sew a curve of small stitches across the base of the fingers and cut the fingers off about 5mm above stitching. Turn right side out.





2) Stuff this hand and thumb and stuff the cuff inside of the glove. Stitch across the bottom using a ladder or whip-stitch.



3) Use the longest cut-off fingers for the head and the tail. Stuff each one. For the tail, turn the raw edges inward and simply stitch the tail to the back end of the dinosaur. Stitch in a circle around the base of the tail attaching it to the back of the dinosaur. The stitching may gather a little and that's fine. 4) The head is stuffed not quite to the very end and stretched over the neck like a sock over a leg. Angle the head slightly to make a nice curve of the neck and head and pin in place. Turn the raw edges under and stitch around using a ladder stitch, connecting the head to the neck. Try not to pull the stitching so tightly that it starts to pucker around the neck. 5) Using a matching or contrasting glove, cut the four fingers off. Stuff them, sew a large running stitch around the opening to gather, and pull tight. Using a chopstick or your finger, poke the raw edges inside the leg so all you see is the puckered gather.

6) Stitch each in its proper place slightly to the side of the center belly seam. If the legs are stuffed well and the stitching secure, the di-



nosaur will be able to stand up well and not sink.

7) Add eyes by making a couple of french knots using embroidery thread, or sew on small buttons or beads.

8) If the neck seam appears to prominent to you, tie a ribbon around the dinosaur's neck or embroider a fancy stitch around the seam to lessen its appearance.

Gods eye baby turtle craft Supplies: Popsicle sticks Colorful yarn Marker Directions:



Paint 3 popsicle sticks with quick dry solid tempera paint.

Once the paint dries, draw on a face and some toes with the marker.


Then, hot glue the turtle together (adults may need Push ENDS to help with this step).

Next tie on a piece of long yarn (make sure to leave a bit of excess yarn so that you can tie the last piece of yarn to the first piece of yarn at the end.)

Then, wrap the yarn around the turtle (across the center), making sure to cover the middle portion. (around 2-3 times each time.)

Begin weaving just like you would with a normal two stick God's eye pattern. Place the yarn over a popsicle stick, wrap it around once, and then place the yarn over the

next popsicle stick, wrap it around, and keep repeating that over and around process.

To change colors, simply tie on another piece of yarn. Once finished, tie the last piece of yarn to the first piece of yarn.

Shrinky Dinks

Supplies:

• #6 recyclable plastic – this is that thin, stiff plastic that is used for lids of disposable aluminum baking dishes and salad containers.

• Sharpies or colored pencils (Sharpies work better)

- Scissors
- A baking sheet.
- An oven

• Hole punch – optional for making keychains.

• Metal keychains – optional DIRECTIONS:

• Cut out any shape you want from the #6 plastic. Draw designs with Sharpies and color them in!

• Each of these designs will shrink down to about 1/3 of their original size, so keep this in mind when drawing your pictures.

• If you want to make keychains, punch the hole now with a hole punch. You won't be able to punch a hole after they come out of the oven.

• Place in the oven on 325 F, they take about 3 minutes to bake. First, they will shrink and wrinkle up and get sort of curly! Then they will flatten out again. Once they are flat, leave them in the oven for about 30 seconds more.

Supplies:

- Paper Plate (no smaller than 11 inches)
- Paper

• Use any medium to turn the paper plate into another object.



I.e.: An animal, rainbow, etc.

• Plate can be folded in half or left whole and paper, felt, pom poms or other items added to create your design.

Be creative.

Tin Utensil/ Office Supply Holder Supplies:

- Tin Can (10.75 oz)
- Fabric/ Paper/ Felt
- Scissors
- Craft foam
- Modge Podge
- Accents to Decorate

Directions:

Cover Tin with modge podge and place Fabric/ Paper or Felt around the can and let dry.

Apply thin layer of modge podge over the fabric/ paper or felt to seal to the can.

Decorate with accents to your liking.

Craft Rules:

• Three age groups: 8 and under, 9-11, 12-14. Age shall be as of January 1, 2024. Must be a Junior Grange member in good standing (except non-member craft). Must be at least 5 years old by the county contest.

• Local Junior Grange contest is to be held at the Leader's discretion. The Junior Deputy oversees the county contest and bringing the county winners to the state session for judging.

• All Juniors are to compete in the county in which they reside, unless their parent(s) or grandparents belong to a Grange in another county, in which case they will compete in the county where their family are members.

• State Awards: 1st place - \$5.00; 2nd place - \$4.00; 3rd place - \$3.00; 4th place - \$2.00; 5th place - \$1.00, plus





ribbons for first eight places and county winner ribbons for each county winning entry brought to state judging.

Art Contest

There are five categories for Junior Art Contest this year.

- 1. Mythological Creature
- 2. City Scape
- 3. Cartoon Character
- 4. Portrait
- 5. Computer Generated Art

Criteria for judging art entries:

• How well the artist uses the medium selected.

- Craftsmanship and skill.
- Composition, presentation, or subject.
- Originality.
- Theme and its treatment.

Rules for Junior Art:

• All entries must be the original work of the member except category E (Computer Generated Art) which is created or manipulated on the computer, then printed.

• All entries must be completed after September 1st of the previous year.

• Entries are judged based on subject categories.

• Nude or inappropriate entries will not be accepted or displayed.

• Size for all classes: Artwork must not exceed 24" x 36" including frame. There is no minimum size. Miniatures will be accepted in all categories.

• All entries must be framed or have firm backing so they can be properly displayed.

• Non-breakable covering (such as Plexi-glass) is accepted. Glass covered entries will not be judged. DO NOT SEND ANY GLASS WITH ENTRIES (backing or frames).

• Computer enhancement of artwork and/or art generated by using computer printers is not permitted except by Category E.

• Sculpture is not accepted, however paintings on saw blades, wooden objects, etc. that are of sturdy and non-breakable nature are accepted.

• Age of the Junior Granger as of January 1 of the current year, must be on the registration card, firmly attached to the back of the entry.

• There are three age divisions for each category: Ages 8 and under, 9-11, and 12-14.

• Entry card must contain the following information neatly printed and securely attached to the back of the art-work: name, address, age (as of 1/1/24), date of birth, Jr. Grange name and number; and county represented.

Photography Contest

There are five categories:

- 1. Country Scene
- 2. Sunrise/Sunset
- 3. Pets may contain one of more pets.

4. Grange/Community Service Activity (Must show a Grange name, logo, or something identifying at least 1 person or place involved with Grange.

5. Patriotic

Criteria for judging photographs:

1. Only prints are accepted for judging – no slides.

2. Photographer must be specific as to the category entered, for each photograph as shown on the entry tag.

3. Each photograph may be entered in only one category.

4. Participants may enter all categories, using different photographs

5. Participants may submit only one entry per category.

6. Entries must be taken after September 1st of the previous year.

7. Prints may be by a commercial process, but photographs must be taken by the junior entering

8. Frame of stiff backing is required for all photographs.9. Size of entry including frame and backing, must be no smaller than 4" x 6" or no larger than 16" x 20".

10. Non-breakable covering (such as Plexi-glass) is accepted. Glass covered entries will not be judged. DO NOT SEND GLASS WITH ENTRY.

11. Only traditional printed photos will be accepted. No computer altered or photocopies are allowed however, the source of the image may be traditional film or digital image.

12. Age and birthdate, of the Junior Member, as of January 1 of the current year MUST be on the registration card attached to the back of the photo.

13. Panoramic photos, close-ups and black and white photographs may be entered in the appropriate category, based on the subject of the photograph.

14. There are three age divisions – 8 and under; 9-11 and 12 to 14.

Participant's identification information for Art and Photography entries: Name, age (as of 1/1/24), complete address, date of birth, Junior Grange name and number, county and category entering. Art and Photography Awards: First, second and third place ribbons as well as 5 - 1st place; 4 - 2nd place; 3 - 3rd place prize will be awarded in each age group and each category in the Junior Division of the Art and Photography contest.

Junior Sign A Song Contest

Song, Phrase, Poetry, and Spoken Word – Individual 8 and under, 9-11, and 12 -14. Group 5–14(2+)

All signing contestants will perform at the state talent contest.

The audible word, which must be used while the contestant is singing, may be a recording, an adult, another junior or the contestant themselves.

ASL (American Sign Language) shall be used.

Entry blanks must be submitted by June 1st to Sarah or me.

Other than the above, the rules of the talent contest apply.

Awards: A plaque will be given to the state winners in each category. Entries are judged based on subject categories.

* Memorization is required in all categories except Piano and Instrumental Solo (Juniors only). * A five-minute maximum time limit applies to all categories.

* Each Junior may compete in a given category only once per year.

* Entry blanks are available in the Junior Leader Handbook or Ohio Granger Magazine, or the State Grange Website and must be sent to the Junior Directors by June 1.

* Number/title being performed MUST accompany the entry.



I want to start by thanking everyone that has found a way to celebrate our 150th Anniversary of the Ohio State Grange in your community. As we are winding down this Grange year, we begin a new one. Recently it has occurred to me that I am approaching 10 years of having the great honor of working with all of you as the Ohio State Community Service Director. Appointed in 2014 by State Master, Robert White, I cannot thank you enough for all of the support you have given me and making this so rewarding. With that said, I would be happy to mentor anyone who would like to also like to have this wonderful experience.

The GRANGE TODAY Stepping Up To Meet The Challenges Of Tomorrow. A fitting theme for the year when it comes to Community Service projects. It took a pandemic for us to realize we must become more agile and responsive as needs in the community arise to be effective in our endeavors. As the Community Service Director - YOU play an integral role in your local Grange activities that directly affect your community and members. Membership can be built on the foundation of your programs making people want to be part of the good works that you do so be sure to publicize them. Also remember to recognize those in your communities in the fields of education, law enforcement and fire fighters. This also puts your grange in the spotlight. Refer to this issue for programs involving community service. But remember you may contact me with any questions.

Join the Ohio State Grange Community Service Facebook page.

Of course it is not a requirement, but here we can share pertinent and timely information about community service projects. We need to let the public know the great works we are doing in our communities. I want YOU to share photos and information about your Grange activities as well as get ideas from other granges that are supporting their communities. The National Community Service Director also frequently shares our posts on the National Community Service Facebook page which you can also join to see what Granges across the United States are sharing.

Community Service Annual Report

As the title suggests, you are charged with supporting your local Grange in all the wonderful service projects that are done that support the communities in which we live. As part of that role, you should keep records of all the projects your Grange participates documenting the details of the projects, how many grangers and sometimes non-Grangers helped with the project and retain copies of any publicity that shows the grange in action. At the annual Ohio State Grange convention, the county deputies receive a packet for you which includes copies of the report form you are to complete. The deadline to submit all reports and nominations for the community service awards is September 1st each year. The reason for the deadline, is I must submit our top report and participation results to the National Grange Community Service director by October 1st. You will mail your report to me and the address is on the form. If you misplace any of the forms or need additional copies of them, all the forms are on the Ohio State Grange website under the forms section with the heading Community Service.

Lecturer & Community Service Workshop

Join us Saturday, March 2, 2024 for the annual Lecturer & Community Service workshop. You do not have to be a Lecturer or Community Service Director to attend. The meeting is held at the Ohio State Grange Office, so bring a carload of Grangers with you. This is a day full of sharing information and participants leave with more than they arrived with. There is a minimal charge for the day which includes morning snacks and lunch. You will contact the State Grange office to reserve your seat for the day. In addition to this annual event, we typically have a short workshop at the annual convention in October for those attending the convention.

Granger of the Year

Recognition is another way we publicize our grange by honoring those that play an important role in our

communities. The National Grange has specific awards that recognize those in the occupational fields of Education, Firefighting and Law Enforcement. You can recognize both Grange members and non-Grange members for these awards and we can recognize both at the state level, however we will only send one entry for each of those awards to the National Grange from Ohio. Also, at the Subordinate and State level we also recognize individuals for their volunteerism and again you can honor both a Grange and non-Grange member for those awards. These are your awards and you should own them. Feel free to submit pertinent information that you want the judges to review so we have a clear picture of the achievements of your candidates – this should include supporting documentation like newspaper and magazine articles talking about their accomplishments and other awards they have received. Also, if you perform interviews with their family or friends please include this information in the application. The judges only have the information you supply them with.

If you have a state winning award recipient, the Ohio State Grange will pay for the convention banquet meal ticket for the award recipient and their spouse. If the award recipient wants to bring family members to see them get the award, typically the local Grange or Pomona will pay for any additional banquet tickets. Otherwise, you must ask the award recipient to pay for the meals. Orchestrating what meals, they want, how many are attending for table placement is all information that will need to be finalized quickly when we are preparing for convention.

Ohio State Grange Hall of Fame

Another recognition for Ohio State Grange members for notable service above and beyond, is by submitting a resolution to the Ohio State Grange office in Fredericktown by the resolution deadline. The resolutions are all reviewed at convention and brought before the delegate body. Those individuals that have received this prestigious award are listed on a plague at the Ohio State Grange Office.

We continue to support the Flying Horse Farm with financial donations. A camp for medically fragile children who attend at no cost as part of the SeriousFun Children's Network. A place where children are not defined by their illnesses. They deliver unforgettable camp experiences that have a lifechanging impact. University Grange Scholarship Guidelines

1. Applications shall be submitted to the Ohio State Grange office at 16303 Village Parkway, Fredericktown, Ohio 43019-9585. The application deadline is July 15, with the selection being made by August 1. Applications are available from The Ohio State Grange office.

2. The scholarship committee shall consist of 3 members including the State Master, a past or present member of University Grange (selected by the State Master), and one person selected by the Executive Committee.

3. A minimum of 2 of the 3 members of the scholarship committee must review the applications and agree on the scholarship awards.

4. Scholarships will be awarded based on the following criteria:

a. Applicant must be a current Grange member in good standing.

b. Applicant must be a currently enrolled student at The Ohio State University.

c. Preference given to active members of University Grange (when it is in active status).

d. Preference given to students on Main Campus.

e. Applicant must meet any additional scholarship eligibility criteria established by The Ohio State University.

f. Award will be based on applicant's involvement in Grange activities, related community service work, grade point average, involvement in other youth groups, and leadership activities.

5. The number and amount of scholarships awarded will be based on the amount of money earned on the scholaship endowment account as reported to the State Grange. The initial goal will be to award 2 scholarships per year of approximately \$500.00 each.

VOSH is the longest running project for the Ohio State Grange Women's Activity and Family Activity. VOSH is Volunteer Optometric Services to Humanity. VOSH-Ohio has served 16 countries since 1987. Your county could have an ice cream social just by collecting the most unwanted prescription eyeglasses, Columbiana County received the ice cream social in March 2023. Ask optometrists offices, Wall Mart optometric, etc. to save glasses for your Grange.

Cases for Smiles pillowcases is another one of our biggest community service projects. You have been putting smiles on children's faces for 16 years. These simple pillowcases bring a great joy to the children with cancer or another terminal illness, and their parents. This little bit of brightness adds a lot to their day. The pattern is simple: see attachment.

Note: Make sure to wash the pillowcase for the protection of the children with suppressed immunity and do not use any softener. In addition, please place each pillowcase in its own zip lock bag.

Here are few frequently asked questions about Cases For Smiles and their work.

Do you take cash donations?

We prefer checks, which can be made payable to Case for Smiles. You can also go online to support our mission and donate. It's easy and secure.

What can I donate other than fabric?

• Unscented detergent

• Ziploc plastic bags: 1 quart size (each pillowcase smile is delivered in its own Ziploc bag)

• Monetary donations are also welcomed! It currently costs about \$11.00 to make a pillowcase. Donations can easily and securely be made online.

How do I wash the pillowcases?

• Most chapters suggest the use of an unscented detergent in cold water with no fabric softener.

• Tampa hospitals require the pillowcases to be washed in vinegar and water

• Dry the case – no scented dryer sheets

• Iron pillowcase and place in a Ziploc plastic bag

Can I deliver the pillowcases myself?

No. The hospitals each have standards we must follow, especially due to the children's low immunity while under treatment. Additionally, many facilities have limited storage and we deliver based on available space.

Is it okay to put a note in the pillowcase?

Yes, a personal note may be inserted (no pins) into the plastic Ziploc bag. Personal notes cannot be of a religious nature.

Do you accept seasonal pillowcases?

Yes, the children love them. In fact, during Halloween, we have seen the children use their pillowcases as Trick or Treat bags. Please note seasonal bags cannot be of a reli

gious nature or theme.

Can I receive a tax credit for sewing pillowcases?

Yes. We are a charitable, 501(c)3 organization. Provide your Regional Coordinator with your name, mailing address and number of pillowcases sewn and we will provide a letter reflecting your donation. All requests must be received by January 15th.

Sadly, I don't sew, but I DO have many other talents! *What can I do to 'help'?*

Everyone has a talent that is needed to help with the pil-lowcases!

• Fabric needs to be cut and washed

- · Pillowcases need to be ironed
- Pillowcases need to be picked up from drop-off sites
- Fundraising is necessary to purchase additional fabric, thread, and supplies.

**Reach out to your Regional Coordinator to see what 'talents' are needed in your specific geography.

My school, scout troop, church group, youth group, etc. want to HOST a sewing event. HOW and what do we do to get this going?

The PDF on website contains some general guidelines to get you started organizing a sewing event for your local organization.

What kind of fabric can I use to sew pillowcases?

• Fabric needs to be 100% cotton

• Remember to use fun, colorful novelty prints!

• Check with local coordinator for local hospitals specific requirements

for example: often time hospitals don't allow flannel and RED pillowcases tend to bleed.

• We do not accept 'No-sew pillowcases'. See PDF for full list of guidelines.

What pattern can I use to sew pillowcases?

Hospitals use standard size pillowcases (20 x 26 inches) Choose a bright and colorful fabric style:

• Border: 1/3 of a yard of fabric cut into a strip: $10 \ 1/2$ inches by 401/2 inches

• Case: 3/4 of a yard: 26 1/2 inches by 40 1/2 inches

• Please see the PDF for detailed instructions



Meaning of "amigurimi" -The word is a blend of the words ami (\Box) meaning crocheted or knitted, and nuigurumi a small, stuffed doll. Although the exact origin of crochet dolls is difficult to place, historians agree that the art probably came from China with records of knitted dolls dating back to the Shang dynasty.

What is the difference between regular crochet and amigurumi?



Amigurumi uses smaller hooks than regular crochet projects.

non-member. Family Talent entrants must be related members of one family and must be Grangers, except for children where there is no Junior Grange. In group entries or families, the participants need not be members of the same Subordinate Grange.

5. Junior Grangers may be part of entries in Subordinate group classes; however, entries in Subordinate group classes must be composed of a majority of Subordinate members. Exception: Family Talent.

6. Vocal contestants may use recorded accompaniment only if it contains minimal back-up.

7. Memorization is not required in piano and instrumental categories. Music and music stand should not interfere with performance.

8. A time limit of FIVE MINUTES will be observed for each contestant. Score points will be deducted for exceeding the maximum time: one point per minute or part thereof will be deducted from the final score.

9. All entrants compete at State contest.

10. During the Talent Contest, a "Best of Show" will be chosen to represent Ohio in the "Evening of Excellence" at the National Grange Convention in November. "Best of Show" winners cannot enter the same class the following year, but may enter a different class.

Participate in a National Grange service project

For 20 years, the Grange has been the leading voice advocating for the expansion of broadband into rural communities. Most frequently, we focus on the infrastructure of build-out, which is still a major factor keeping millions of Americans from high-speed, reliable internet to their homes. However, for others, broadband is available but unaffordable. For this reason, the National Grange is actively working to promote the FCC's Affordable Connectivity Program, which provides a discount benefit for broadband to low-income and other eligible individuals.

After receiving a grant to assist with the program's promotion, we have begun registering Granges to take part in the work to inform people in the communities in which Granges are located, and beyond, about ACP. Please remember that taking part in this outreach program is community service. Certainly, we want all Grange members to know about the benefit and sign up if they are eligible, but this cannot stop within our doors. Just like giving nonperishable items to the food bank is important, so is taking the information about ACP to the director of the food bank and asking for it to be placed in the boxes and bags of recipients. Please take the time to register your Grange to take part in this outreach service, which will allow you to receive free materials to give to your local food bank, to senior centers, to veterans' organizations in your hometown, to place on bulletin boards in your halls and in other community spaces, to put on tables at events your Grange takes part in and more. From placemats that can be used at your community breakfasts and dinners to yard signs that can be placed on the lawns of members whose properties are on well-traveled roadways, there are many ways your Grange can increase awareness about the ACP program.

When you register through grange.biz/signupgrange or by texting or calling National Grange Membership and Leadership Development Director Amanda Brozana Rios at 301-943-1090 and leaving a message, you will be assigned a Community Navigator - an individual that works with our partner, Oregon Institute for a Better Way, to help Granges plan for the outreach, order and packaging the materials, perform data collection and more. Navigators - all of whom are also Grange members - will also work to collect more information about your Grange, its outreach, goals, and needs.

This data will help us create future grant proposals and allow us to search for grants and other funds that may directly benefit individual Granges. Granges that take part in this program may even be eligible for a small financial incentive, but it all starts with the first step of registering your Grange to become an outreach partner. Registering through this link does not commit your Grange, but will instead allow you to receive further information and connect with a navigator to brainstorm and talk about your Grange. **Community Service threads through Grange Degrees** By Pete Pompper, National Grange Comm. I am very proud of the partnership we have fostered with Rural Minds (thank you Burton Eller for starting this process) on a National level that so many Community Granges have responded to, and have held or are holding Rural Suicide Awareness and Mental Health programs. Granges are teaming up with other groups that focus on these needs in rural America, and the community turnout has been amazing. It shows how much the Grange is looked at as a trusted organization in the local communities and wants to help - even on an uncomfortable subject.

The more we work with others not only strengthens our communities but also the Grange. It gives your Grange visibility with others and in the community you serve. We always talk about opening our doors to the world not only to help people, but we also want to work with others.

Think of how this will help build your membership. How many of us only belong to one group or organization? People like to be part of groups that are community service minded, have fun,and can socialize on many levels. The Grange can fulfill that need.


